An illustrated map of the Jefferson Davis Highway was shown. This national highway named for one of the great men of the nation extends from Washington across the continent to California, traversing the Southern States, a spur extending to Kentucky to President Davis' birthplace. Mrs. Lon Campbell read tributes to the Confederacy's only president. One came from the late Hon. Joe Carlton, a Union man, who is quoted by Senator Hubert Stephens as saying, "The three greatest men this nation has produced are George Washington, Abraham Lincoln and Jefferson Davis."
