Passes; Funeral Monday Morning

Funeral services for Miss Alberta Staub, who died at her home here Saturday night, were held at 7:00 o'clock Monday morning at the Presbyterian church, with the pastor, Rev. H. T. Bridgman officiating. Interment was in Highlands cemetery.

Miss Staub was born in Netstal, Glarus Canton, Switzerland, in 1866. She was the daughter of the late Albert and Anna Elise Staub, coming to this country with her parents when a very small child. For a time the family lived in Ohio, and Miss Staub was educated at Urbana College in that state. They later lived in Savannah and Atlanta, Ga., and came to Highlands to make their home about fifty-five years ago.

Miss Staub served many years on the board of trustees for the Hudson Library Association and as librarian. She was one of the founders of the Highlands Museum and Biological Laboratory; at one time assistant postmaster, and a leader in club work here. She had been in the real estate and insurance business for the past 25 years. Miss Staub was a member of the Swedenborg New-Church in Ohio, and took an active part in Sunday School and church work in her younger days. There are no immediate survivors.
