Christmas shopping and mailing for folks at home as well as for service men, must be done early this year, or empty stockings will be the result on Christmas day. That is the opinion of local merchants and the assurance of Postmaster Tom Porter.

Not only are the stores rapidly emptying of many lines of goods formerly used as Christmas gifts, but the post offices of the country this year are already tremenduously handicapped by manpower difficulties.

All over the United States, post offices are cutting down on the number of deliveries customarily made and are eliminating many collections. Some 16,000 postal employees have gone into the armed forces and many thousands more have gone into defense jobs,

To make deliveries of Christmas mail this year more difficult, trains are running into unavoidable delays being held up by war freight and troop movements. Where post offices customarily

hire extra trucks and workers for the Christmas season, both will be difficult to get. All of which leads up to the old,

old advice which takes on new meaning this year: Do your Christmas shopping and mailing early!
