Last year when our 4-H Club was organized, I chose gardening and food preservation as projects. Mother enlarged our garden to twice its original size and gave me half—100 x 40 feet. I grew 58 varieties of vegetables, including the African squash and edible soy bean. I saved seeds from many of the varieties grown and had a nice supply of squash, cabbage, and root crops for storing, I grew my garden to help the family food supply and for the local markets, thereby releasing commercial foods for our Army and allies. My total profits above all costs, and including value of vegetables used at home, were \$96.52.

### RICE AU GRATIN

3 c. cooked rice 1-2 c. grated cheese Salt and Paprika 1-2 c. buttered crumbs 1 1-2 c. thin white sauce.

Fill a well oiled casserole with alternate layers of rice and white sauce. Season to taste. Sprinkle with cheese. Cover with crumbs Sprinkle top with paprika. Bake in moderate oven 375 degrees F. for 20 minutes or until well browned. 6 servings.

OLD STYLE 'N' DUMPLINGS. 2 lbs. lean yeal, cut in serving slices

3 tbsp. fat 1 small onion, chopped

1 medium stalk celery, chopped 1 tsp. salt.
