Young Workers Urged To Obtain Social Security Cards

Some students now have parttime jobs. They may be working in stores, or in shops after school and on Saturdays. As more men go into the armed forces, and as more men and women find jobs in war and other essential indus tries, added numbers of boys and will obtain social security cards and go into after-school work,

D. W. Lambert, manager of the Social Security Board field office at Asheville, says that every pupil who takes a job should realize the importance of safeguarding his account number card. The card represents his insurance policy with the Federal Government It is the key to the wage credit which he will receive as a result of employment in jobs covered by the oldage and survivors insurance system. In due time those wage credits may entitle him to monthly benefits for himself and his fam-

The young worker should guard his social security account number card as he would any other important document. He is advised also to copy his number carefully and keep that record handy. The card itself could be kept in a safe box or drawer together with important family documents.

Because Americans are too careless with their account number cards, the Social Security Board issued 1,861,000 duplicate cards during the year 1941. The duplicate cards issued in 1941 alone cost the Federal Government \$500,000 - a sum which would buy 833 machine guns or 555 jeeps or 25,000,000 rounds of pistol ammunitation.

NYA Places 19 Macon Youths In War Work

War production training projects of the National Youth Administration, War Manpower Commission, in North Carolina placed 19 youths from Macon County in employment in industries holding essential war contracts during the first six months of the current year, it has been announced.

North Carolina youths were prin-cipally placed in the shipbuilding and aircraft industries, with largest groups entering employment in the yards of the Norfolk Navy Yard, North Carolina Shipbuilding Company, Newport News building & Dry Dock Company, and the Glenn L. Martin bomber factory at Baltimore. Among other industries taking substantial groups of North Carolina youths were Wright Automatic Machinery Company, Baltimore Dry Dock Company, United States Signal Corps in civil service positions, Fairchild Aircraft Corporation, and military bases recently located in the state. Several replacements were made in the government shipyards at Pearl

Harbor during the same period. NYA projects now in operation in North Carolina, with the types of training provided, are located as follows: Elizabeth City, welding and machine shop; Rocky Mount, sheet metal, foundry, machine shop, aircraft woodworking, and welding; Greenville, radio, machine shop and aircraft woodworking; mington, welding; Scotland Neck aircraft woodworking; Kinston, aircraft woodworking; Washington, aircraft woodworking; sheet metal, radio, welding, air woodworking, and machine shop; Raleigh, radio, machine shop, and aircraft woodworking; Burlington, aircraft sheet metal, aircraf welding, aircraft woodworking, and machine shop; Greensboro, power sewing; Lexington, aircraft woodworking; Lenoir, production woodworking; Winston-Salem, welding and machine shop; Charlotte, sheet metal, welding, radio, machine shop, and production woodworking; and Asheville, machine shop, radio, welding, sheet metal, ship carpentry, and auto mechannics.

Young men and women between the ages of 16 and 24 who wish to take training for war jobs are asked to see Mrs. Margaret Ordway, in Franklin.

Payments To Dependents Of Those Missing In Action

Payments to dependents of military or civilian personnel, officially reported missing, missing in action, captured or interned, are authorized by law, it was announced today by Headquarters, Fourth Service

Command. These payments may be by continuation of previously made allotments, by increases in such allot-ments, or by making new allotments, deductions to be made from the pay which accrues to the credit of the missing person, according

to the regulation.

Increased or additional allotments may not exceed the amount required for the reasonable support of dependents and in no case may they, with other deductions from pay, exceed the base and longevity pay to be credited to the absent

It is pointed out that other relief authorizations in this law include payments of insurance premiums by allotments from pay and provision for transportation of depende ts and effects of persons killed, injured or missing, as a result of military operations.

The above regulation is in addition to Form 625; covering family allowance payments made to de-pendents of enlisted men in the four lowest grades. However, increased allotments may be made to those dependents to cover an emergency or to supplant a family allowance which is proved to be inadequate.

Emphasis is made of the importance of soldiers in these grades making family allowance applica-tions (Form 625), since this allowance continues if the soldier is later reported missing, captured or interned. Should a soldier in these four grades have no family allowance in effect and is reported missing, a dependent needing sup-port should apply for the family allowance and may also make application for an additional allotment from the soldier's pay, if the family allowance can be proved insufficient.

Dependents finding it necessary to make application for family allowances or for additional allotments and services, are advised to contact the nearest Red Cross chapter, which will assist in pre-paring such applications, or to write directly to the Dependency Allotment Section, Allowance and Allotment Branch, A. G. O. Building, "Y", 20th and B Sts., N. E., Washington, D. C., with a full statement of the circumstances.

RECLASSIFICATION OF MAN-POWER

The bureau of selective service, of the War Manpower Commission began promptly on April 1 to reclassify registrants in certain activities and occupations designated on February 2 as "non-deferrable" regardless of dependents, WMC chairman Paul V. McNutt has announced. This order affects only registrants of military age.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION DISCON-TINUED

Distribution of foods state welfare departments to local communities for use in school lunch programs is being discontinued on April 30, according to the department of agriculture. Under a new program announced in February, schools are able to pur chase foods locally for their lunch programs and receive reimburse-ment from the food distribution
