Advice Given By Dr. Sisk

The Macon county health department has been conducting clinics for mothers, infants and expectant mothers in an effort to give all those who cannot afford a physician the service that is necessary for the health of mothers and ba-

Clinics are held in Franklin at the Health Department office every third Friday. From 40 to 50 have attended these clinics. The High-lands clinic in the Satulah club rooms is held the first Thursdays of the month and at Otter Creek schools the second Fridays. Plans are under way for new clinics at Otto and West's Mill, thus making service available to as many as possible. The clinics are directed by Dr. C. N. Sisk, county health officer and conducted by Dr. Mary B. H. Michal, assisted by Mrs. Josephine D. Gaines, county nurse. Patients who attend clinics will be referred to their physicians for

medical treatment. "Expectant mothers deserve the very best prenatal and obstetric possible during pregnancy and childbirth in order to avoid the complications which sometimes result in death or permanent injury," says Dr. Sisk.

Dr. Sisk has issued the following valuable advice and information: The best care, of course, is the

family physician. If it is not pos-sible to secure the services of a physician the next best service available is the well trained mid-wife. The laws of North Carolina permit the practice of midwifery and place the responsibility of training and issuing permits upon Mrs. S. C. Valuable Information And conducts classes for the instruction of midwives to emphasize as much what a midwife should not do as what she should do.

Legal Requirements

After a midwife is given the prescribed amount of instructions, has provided herself with the required equipment, has shown a spirit of cooperation, has been found in good health, free from tuberculosis, syphilis, and other communicable diseases, is of good moral character and reasonably clean in personal hygiene she is given a permit under Section 7197 of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina to practice midwifery for a period of one year. Anyone practicing midwifery without this permit is subject to prosecution and upon conviction, a fine of fifty dollars or imprisonment for thirty days.

Occasionally a midwife is found who assumes to know more than the one required to give her instructions and refuses to take instructions or provide herself with proper equipment to practice mid-

The public should demand to see the permit before engaging her. During the year 1942 there 502 children born in Macon county, of which 56 or 11 percent were attended by midwives. The registered midwives of the county at present are as follows:
