Highlands Goes Over Top; Bond Sales Reach \$30,000

In a total of slightly more than \$30,000, Highlands went over the top in the Fourth War Loan Drive with a 50 per cent increase over its quota of

Much of the credit for the success of the drive goes to Highlands school for its exceptional work. \$10,500, or onethird of the total was handled

by the school here with its enrollmet of 374 pupils. Particular credit goes to Paul Price, 13 year old seventh grade student, who had sold between 30 and 40 bonds up to noon Tuesday, totaling \$7,200, with every evidence of increasing this amount by at least \$500 before the close of the drive Tuesday night.
