Highlands Goes Over Top; Bond Sales Reach \$30,000

Paul Price, 7th Grader Leads In School Sales

In a total of slightly more than \$30,000, Highlands went over the top in the Fourth War Loan Drive with a 50 per cent increase over its quota of \$20,000.

Much of the credit for the success of the drive goes to Highlands school for its exceptional work. \$10,500, or one-third of the total was handled

by the school here with its enrollment of 374 pupils. Particular credit goes to Paul Price, 13 year old seventh grade student, who had sold between 30 and 40 bonds up to noon Tuesday, totaling \$7,200, with every evidence of increasing this amount by at least \$500 before the close of the drive Tuesday night. This gives Paul the highest sales record in Highlands school and perhaps the highest individual school sales record in Macon county. Paul also bought a \$25.00 bond for himself.

National Forest Timber For Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Franklin, North Carolina, up to and not later than 2:00 p.m., March 20, 1944, and opened immediately thereafter, for all merchantable live and dead timber designated for cutting on an area embracing about 500 acres within the High Laurel Branch Unit, Nantahala River Watershed, Macon County, Nantahala National Forest, North Carolina, estimated to be 2500 units (100 cubic feet per unit) of chestnut extractwood, more or less. No bid of less than \$0.80 per unit will be considered. In addition to price bid for stumpage a deposit of \$0.10 per unit for all wood cut will be required for sale area betterment work. \$300 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids reserved. 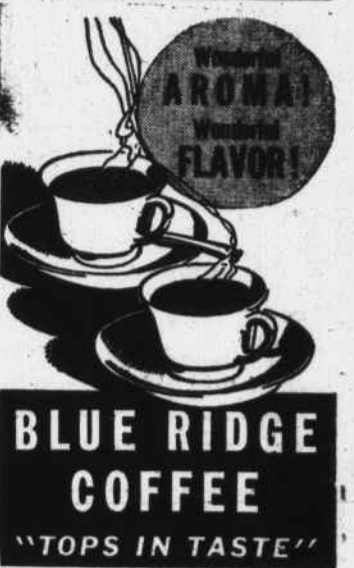
