Conforming with state and national P. T. A. programs, the December meeting of the Highlands P. T. A. will feature a program on "Character Building". It has been announced by Mrs. Thomas C. Harbison, president. The meeting will be held Tuesday afternoon, December 4, at 3:15 o'clock in the science room at the school. At the November meeting of the parent-teacher association, Mrs. A. Rockwell Nall explained briefly the scholarship offered by the Jane S. McKimmon educational loan fund for girls who are interested in a college education in home economics. This fund is available only to girls from the rural districts of the state who are able to present sufficient credits from an accredited high school, and who are students in North Carolina colleges. Mrs. Nall stated that preference would be given 4-H club girls, and that no loan would exceed \$200 annually.

The North Carolina Federation of Home Demonstration Clubs has issued a pamphlet on this educational loan fund showing its aims, its growth, and its accomplishments for the past 15 years, which will be of interest to persons qualified to take advantage of the loan fund. The names of two Macon county girls taking advantage of the scholarship loan this year are listed in the pamphlet.
