Three of them—Arthur F. Keyton of Canton, Simon P. Maney of Cherokee, and Robert W. Roper of Whittier—have had previous army service. The other five, all 18-year olds, are: Clekey W. West of Andrews, Charles L. Crawford of Andrews, James H. Frady, son of Mrs. Zonnie Mashburn, of Nantahala, Joseph Earl Mack, son of Mrs. Ollie Mack, of Nantahala, and Jesse James Hill of Cherokee.

Sgt. Blaine L. Livingston, in charge of the recruiting station, this week also made public a statement of Gordon L. Moore, chairman of the county school board, praising the army's educational program.

"We believe," Mr. Moore said in part, "that the army is giving many hundreds of thousands of young men educational opportunities they could not afford otherwise." In addition to the "splendid training while they are in uniform," Mr. Moore pointed out, they are entitled, at the end of their enlistment, to a year's refresher course in a trade or business school, with tuition paid and a monthly living allowance.

However, if cooperation is not forth-coming, the proper authorities are notified.

Thus strict supervision of beer retailing and close cooperation with law-enforcement authorities assure the maintenance of wholesome conditions wherever beer is sold.
