#### Durham Farmer Long Ago Found Late Plowing **Injures Roots**

C. B. Green, of Durham county, who is perhaps the best corn grower in North Carolina, cred-

its a resolution he made years ago as a farm boy for his success as a scientific farmer today Outstripping the state's aver-

age yield by 100 bushels per acre last year, Green grew 121 bush-els of corn on a demonstration acre

The Durham farmer recalls that when he was a youngster his father was a believer in intensive cultivation for corn. Year after year the lad followed the south end of a north-bound mule, and vice versa, plowing away long after the corn was tall enough for the blades to cut his face as he moved up and down the rows Nursing the corn blade scratches, he resolved that at 21 he would never again cultivate a crop after it was tall enough to slash him in the face. The big year arrived and

young Green, now a "man", rented a "one-mule" corn crop from his dad and laid it by when the stalks were "hip-high." His neighbors agreed with his father that the crop would "not yield enough to feed a chipmonk." His yield of 40 barrels surprised the neighborhood and gave him a start toward the purchase of a farm. Late cultivation of corn, Green

says, disturbs the root system of the plant, decreasing its power to draw plant food from the soil and reducing yields. It is by following this tnesis, stop-ping cultivation early, plus the of close spacing and proper fertilization, that the Durham farmer has managed phenomenal corn yields through the years

dried herbs as basil, sweet marjoram and summer savory is especially good in spring om-lets, or scrambled eggs. Chopped dill leaves and celery tips also may be used in the mixture. The herbs may be added directly to the eggs, or, for a more pronounced flavor, allow to soak a short time in the milk which is added to the eggs.

For macherel aux fines herbes mix a fourth cup of fat with minced sprigs of parsley, fennel, mint and thyme and salt, pepper, cinnamon and nutmeg. Spread the seasoned fat over the fish, which has been split down the back. Then broil or fry. After removing the cooked fish to the platter, add two tablespoonfuls of orange juice to the drippings in the pan and pour over the fish before serving. Fresh succulent leaves of dill in sour cream gives a de-licious flavor to mackerel or other fish.


