Social Security Representative To Be Here June 7

A representative of the Asheville field office of the social security board will be at the register of deeds office in Franklin, June 7, according to an announcement received here.

Wage earners who have worked in a job covered by the Social Security act since December 31, 1936, and have attained age 65, may be eligible to file claim for themselves, their wives, or minor children, whether they have an account number or not, it is pointed out. Surviving relatives of deceased workers, such as widows, children, or parents, or if none of the above, persons who have paid funeral expenses, may be eligible to file claim.

To Be Closed To Deer Hunting This Year

RALEIGH—Western counties of North Carolina will be closed to deer hunting next season while deer trapping and redistribution are being effected, according to an announcement made by John D. Findlay, game and fish commissioner. The Board of Conservation and Development adopted the division's plan at the recent meeting in Fayetteville.

There will be no deer hunting next year in and west of the line composed of the following counties: Warren, Nash, Edgecombe, Wilson, Greene, Wayne, Johnston, Wake, Chatham, Randolph, Montgomery, Richmond, and Scotland.

Explaining the program, Findlay said that, under the proposed plan, deer will be trapped on concentrated areas in Western North Carolina and moved into other areas in the western counties which should support deer but in which there are no deer at present. This program does not contemplate moving deer from western North Carolina to eastern North Carolina.
