Nantahala Forest Timber For Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Franklin, North Carolina, up to and not later than 2:00 p. m. June 17, 1946 and opened immediately thereafter for all live timber marked or designated for cutting and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 400 acres within the Rocky Bald Unit of White Oak Creek, and about 100 acres within the R. S. Jones tract on Ben Branch and Cold Springs Units, these units being on the Nantahala River watershed, Macon County, Nantahala National Forest, North Carolina, estimated to be 1100 M feet more or less of yellow poplar, northern red oak, white ash, white oak, red maple, sugar maple, chestnut oak, scarlet oak, black oak, basswood, cucumber, yellow and black birch, black cherry, buckeye, silverbell, black locust, black gum, hickory, chestnut and hemlock sawtimber.

No bid of less than \$15.00 per M for yellow poplar; \$9.00 per M for white oak, sugar maple, black cherry and white ash; \$8.00 per M for northern red oak; \$7.00 per M for basswood and cucumber; \$6.00 per M for red maple; \$2.00 per M for chestnut oak; black oak and black locust; \$1.00 per M for scarlet oak, chestnut, hemlock, buckeye, silverbell, black gum and hickory will be considered. In addition to prices bid for stumpage, a deposit of \$1.00 per M feet for all timber cut, with the exception of buckeye, silverbell, black gum and hickory will be required for sale area betterment work. \$1,000.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. In accordance with the letter of the Stabilization Administrator to the Secretary of Agriculture of January 29, 1946, this timber will be sold at the appraised prices stated above. The purpose of this notice is to give all interested parties an opportunity to bid at these appraised prices. Bids in excess of these stated prices will be reduced to the prices herein stated. In the event of more than one bid, award will be made by lot or otherwise in the interest of obtaining maximum production of forest products needed in the Reconversion Program. NOTICE OF SPECIAL BOND ELECTION AND NEW REGISTRATION IN THE TOWN OF FRANKLIN, NORTH CAROLINA

A special election will be held between 6:30 A. M., and 6:30 P. M., Eastern Standard Time, on Tuesday, June 25, 1946, at which there will be submitted to the qualified voters of the Town of Franklin the following questions:

1. Shall an ordinance passed May 14, 1946 authorizing not exceeding \$70,000 bonds of the Town of Franklin for extending the waterworks system of said Town, by the installation of additional water mains and hydrants, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
2. Shall an ordinance passed May 14, 1946 authorizing not exceeding \$20,000 bonds of the Town of Franklin for extending the sanitary sewer system of said Town, by the laying of additional sewer lines, and tax for said bonds, be approved?
3. Shall an ordinance passed May 14, 1946 authorizing not exceeding \$30,000 bonds of the Town of Franklin for reconstructing

the surface of streets in said Town, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?

Each of the three questions hereinabove set forth contains a statement of the purpose for which the bonds are authorized by the ordinance referred to in such question. If said bonds are issued, a tax will be levied for the payment of the principal and interest thereof on all taxable property in the Town of Franklin.

A new registration has been ordered and no one will be permitted to vote unless registered anew. The books for said new registration shall be open for the registration of voters from 9:00 A. M. until sunset on each day, except Sundays and holidays, beginning Saturday, May 25, 1946, and closing Saturday, June 15, 1946. On each Saturday during said period said books shall remain open at the polling place. Saturday, June 22, 1946, shall be Challenge Day.
