"Neglect by the American people of American history and traditions is proverbial. The Nikwasi Association therefore wisely sets forth to violate a tradition which deserves disrespect. "Macon County is rich in the legends and history of the Cherokee Indians. With the Mound as an appropriate nucleus, citizens of Franklin and Macon County in the years to come might establish a Cherokee Indian museum that would become a worthy memorial of the ancient inhabitants of the valley of the Little Tennessee who were among the first Americans."
