

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Hewell Designated Laboratory Director For Another Year

Dr. Ralph M. Sargent was re-elected president of the High-lands Museum and Biological Laboratory, and Dr. Thelma Howell again was designated resident director of the Laboratory, at the annual meeting of the corporation Sunday.

Dr. H. L. Blomquist was chos-en vice-president, and Mrs. Robert Hager and Miss Gertrude Harbison were reelected secre-tary and treasurer, respectively W. C. Coker again was elect-

ed honorary president.

A plan designed to bring at least two outstanding Southern scientists to the Highland Lab-oratory next year, as well as a number of graduate students in the biological sciences, was adopted at the meeting on Sun-

In announcing the accomplishments of the sixteenth year of the corporation, President Sar-gent pointed out that the Mu-seum and Laboratory are performing all the functions for which they were organized: Providing an active museum of natural history; offering com-munity entertainment and instruction in all phases of natur-"al life; bringing together South-ern biologists for consultation, work, and friendship; achieving research in the biological scien-

The people of Highlands, it was pointed out, have shown by their efforts and money that they want this valuable work to be carried on, and are willing to give it their generous support. A flourishing and use-ful future for the institution was predicted by Dr. Sargent.

Clifford Pope, director of the Museum, in describing the live exhibits, revealed to the audience that two kinds of snakes had actually been born in the museum that very day: Some hatched from eggs, others given birth by their mother. He pointout that reptiles and amphibians are the easiest way to interest children in outdoor life. Director Pope said that the series of events presented at the museum this summer under the direction of B. E. Fernow would do credit to any metropolitan museum in New York or Chi-

Miss Howell, resident director of the Laboratory, announced that the Laboratory expects to publish soon a list of the summer flowering plants, of Highlands, compiled by the Misses Keever and Quarterman. It will contain more than 650 species Mrs. F. W. Altstaetter told the
