Plans have been completed the Highlands Presbyterian church for a basement which will furnish a dining room. kitchen, three class rooms and a furnace room.

The space for these rooms has been secured by excavating under the church building, and much of the excavation has been completed. At the present time the building of new foundations and basement walls is progressslowly. The Rev. Davidson, pastor, said that at this stage some \$1.700 has been raised with a goal of \$3,000. Mr. Davidson said also that this additional space will make possible the realization of two aims of the church to provide a full program, that of fellowship and recreation, and that other plans for a fuller church program in the future will come nearer with the completion of this project.




