

Niswonger Gives Points the cleaning and care of the sewing machine will be held in On Varieties And Culture

The best months for planting grapes and muscadine grapes are November and March, says H. R. Niswonger, in charge of extension horticulture at State college.

He suggests five varieties of bunch grapes from which to make selections for the home garden. The Portland and Niagra are white and bear early. The Deleware is red and early. The Fredonia is black and midseason The Catawba is red and late.

The best varieties of muscadine grapes are the scupper-nong, which is white; Thomas, reddish black; and the James and Mish, both black.

Mr. Niswonger suggests that four one-year-old bunch grapes be planted in the home garden, set 10 by 10 feet. Plant two muscadine grape vines about 20 feet apart Practically all va rieties of muscadines are sterile and there should be one male vine with one to eight varieties. In the first year's pruning, Mr. Niswonger recommends that

When pruning bunch grapes in later years, pruning consists of having two canes of the previous year's growth tied to each of two wires, one running each way from the trunk, or four new canes, bearing eight to 10 buds each. The new canes should be selected from those starting nearest the trunk. Fruiting canes of the previous season's growth between the selected canes and the trunk should be cut back to two buds.

The training of the muscadine grape on the arbor con-sists in developing eight 'arms radiating to the top of the trunk on each of the wires crossing the center post. The unit of pruning is an arm of one to eight years old, sup-porting several spurs with four buds each.


