Dies At Age Of 85; Rites Held At Carson Chapel

Mrs. Josephine Waldroop, 85, died in the Angel hospital here Monday morning about 4 o'clock, where she had been a patient since September 10 where she received a broken hip in a fall at her home, Franklin, Route 1. "Aunt Josie", as she was affectionately known to many friends, was the former Miss Josephine Allman, daughter of the late George Allman and Martha Crawford Allman, and had lived her entire life in Macon county. Born October 29, 1860, had she lived another day she would have celebrated her 86th birthday. She was a member of the Carson Chapel Methodist church. In 1882 she was married to Thad S. Waldroop, who died in October, 1922.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Carson Chapel Methodist church, with the Rev. W. Jackson Huneycutt, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. D. P. Grant, pastor of Louisa Methodist church. Interment followed in the church cemetery.

The survivors include five sons, Burnell, Byron, Bert, Neilson and Gilmer Waldroop, all of Franklin, Route 1; two daughters, Mrs. Claude Harden, of Canton, and Mrs. Wade A. Reece, of Andrews; and 24 grandchildren, and 13 great-grandchildren.

Bryant funeral home was in charge of the arrangements.

roads in the state, and discussed the educational situation at length. He said it is proposed to let to contract 3,000 of the state's 48,000 miles of secondary roads yearly.

He cited figures on the growth of expenditures for public education, told his hearers that one-fourth of North Carolina's population is in the public schools, and added his hope that it will be possible "to do something reasonably substantial" in the way of salary increases for teachers at the next session of the general assembly.

The governor was introduced by George B. Patton, and H. W. Cabe, chairman of the county Democratic executive committee, presided.

Following the executive's address, Mr. Patton introduced Dan K. Moore, of Sylva, unopposed Democratic nominee for solicitor, and the party's nominees for county offices.
