election year, and about 4,000 in the off-year election of 1942.

In the race for representative, Herbert A. McGlamery nosed out his Republican opponent, Sanford J. Smith, by a vote of 3,121 to 2,399. Mr. McGlamery was second from the top in the size of his vote.

W. E. (Gene) Baldwin, reelected chairman of the board of county commissioners, won over J. D. Burnette, of Highlands, by a count of 3,105 to 2,381. The latter figure, however, does not include Mr. Burnette's vote in Cartoogechaye, which had not been reported.

The unofficial vote in the races for two memberships on the board of county commissioners stood: W. W. Edwards, Democrat, 2,956; J. W. Roane, Democrat, 2,980; Clyde O. Morgan, Republican, 2,364; and C. W. Henderson, Republican, 2,452—with the Republican vote in Cartoogechaye not reported.

The vote for coroner stood: O. L. Blaine, Democrat, 2,974; Henry Corbin, Republican, 2,482.

Dan K. Moore, of Sylva, unopposed Democratic candidate for solicitor, received an unofficial vote of 3,194, and John Dalton, unopposed for the post of county surveyor, had an unofficial total of 2,979.

In most cases, the Democrats carried Franklin, Highlands, Smith Bridge, Cartoogechaye, and Cowee townships, and the Republicans the other seven—Millshoal, Sugarfork, Ellijay, Flats, the two Nantahalas, and Burningtown.

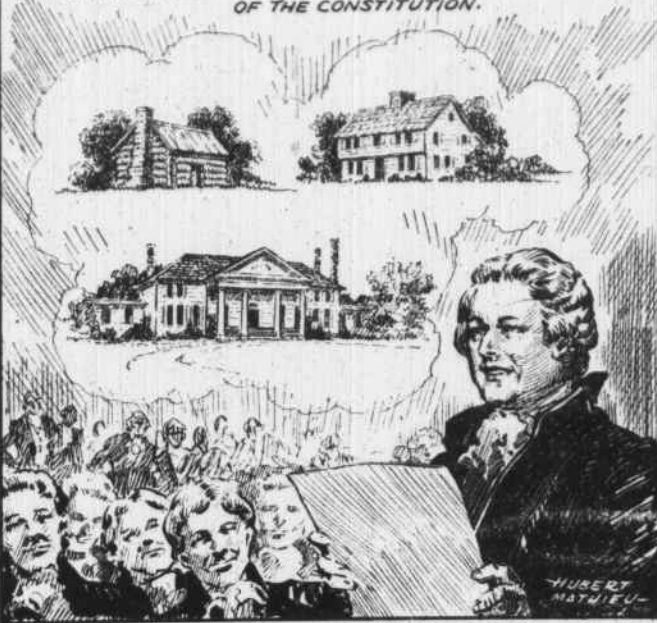

**Summarizes Year's Work**  
G. B. Dixon, assistant county agent, in commenting on the year's 4-H club work cited the following highlights:

The clubs in this county raised \$700 for their cabin at the new Mountain Experiment station—the first county to raise its quota; 13 delegates attended the 4-H short course in Raleigh; 14 girls participated in the county dress revue, four attended the district show in Asheville, and one girl entered the dairy food demonstration held in Asheville; 13 boys showed dairy calves at the Junior Dairy show September 13 and three 4-H boys entered beef calves at the Fat Stock show October 24; and 4-H church Sunday was observed by all clubs May 26.
