Keeping farm records offers the simplest and most ac means of achieving this. accurate Four steps are necessary in keeping a farm record, first of

which is to take an inventory of all farm property at the end of the year. This means recording the number and value of all items of property the farmer owns or owes.

Second step is keeping a re-cord of farm income and ex-penses. Often, the best means of doing this is to carry a small notebook on which can be re-corded all transactions as they Later, they can transferred to the permanent record book.
