MUSEUM TO OPEN TO PUBLIC JULY 1

Dr. J. J. Friauf, New Director, Expected To Arrive Soon

Plans for the summer activities of the Highlands museum are taking shape, with the arrival of the new director, Dr. James J. Friauf, of Vanderbilt university, expected shortly. The museum will be open to the public daily (except Mondays) through the months of July and August.

Dr. Friauf will hold a series of weekly classes in nature study for young people, and, under the chairmanship of Professor B. B. Fernow, of Clemson college, the museum will again offer a series of popular events in the fields of natural science and mountain culture.

Dr. Friauf studied biology at the Universities of Florida and Michigan, and had practical experience in museum work at the Museum of Zoology, University of Michigan, he thus is well qualified to display and add to the collections of the Highlands museum. He also has the double advantage of being trained in both zoology and botany.

Dr. Friauf plans to devote his life to the study of the biology of the southeast. He believes that the Highlands area holds a key position for such study. It offers unsurpassed opportunities for the study of plant and animal life to professional scientists and amateur nature lovers alike, he feels.

The museum, on East Main street, will be opened to visitors on Tuesday, July 1. It is expected that the first event of the season will be a reception, honoring Dr. and Mrs. Friauf Sunday, July 6, to which all Highlands people are invited.
