assistant director of the station, and Wayne L. Corpening, Haywood county farm agent.

"The official variety tests are the means of showing the particular varieties of all crops suited to a given locality," A. D. Stuart, seed specialist of State college extension service, said. What new varieties look like, how they stand the rigors of the winter weather, and the ravages of various diseases and insects, will also be shown.

"Last but not least," Mr. Stuart said, "the yielding ability of the various crops can be estimated, and in a few months, the exact yields recorded by those in charge of the official variety tests can be seen." By following the results of these tests, many crop failures due to poor varieties can be avoided, he said.

Members of the seed improvement staff at State college will be on hand to explain the merits of the crops on test.

## Emphasizes Farm Fire Prevention

All the money you make from this season's crops won't begin to pay for the damage done if your farmhouse or barn is destroyed by fire this summer, David S. Weaver, head of the department of agricultural engineering at State college, remarked this week.

"This is no time to take chances," he said, adding that four farm buildings catch fire every hour. "Fire is one of your worst enemies, and since everyone has a few spare moments at this time of year, it may pay real dividends to do a little

checking up."

Just a few simple precautions taken now will help protect your own property, and reduce the terrible record of present fire losses, he pointed out.

For example, see that your house and barn have adequate lightning protection, he said because it will not be long until summer thunder storms are here again. Then check your farm machinery and wiring for loose electrical connections or frayed wiring.

A careful inspection should be made of the gasoline and kerosene storage places to make sure that no gas has overflowed on the floor. A single spark can cause a bad fire if your fuel storage places aren't kept clean.

This is a good time of year to check the fire extinguishers, too, he said, and make sure they are in good working condition. During the inspection of the property, certain areas that are not adequately protected with approved extinguishers may be found. Right now is the time to correct these.
