SUMMER TELLS SCHOOL PLANS

Highlands Principal Urges Larger Daily Attendance

The Highlands school will open at 8:45 a. m., the same hour as last year, Thursday, September 4, Principal O. F. Summer announced this week. A teachers' meeting, set for 2:30 p. m. on Wednesday, will precede the school opening.

Due to a low attendance average last year, the high school lost one teacher, Mr. Summer said, but he added that the county and state school officials have decided to allot three high school teachers to Highlands school for the year 1947-48, so that the school may keep an accredited high school such as it has had since 1932. This means, Mr. Summer said, that all high school work will be accepted by colleges on the same basis as other high schools of the state.

Pointing out that the allotment of an extra teacher not earned by average daily attendance is only for one year, the state school officials having stressed this fact in a letter to the county superintendent, Mr. Summer said it is very necessary that the patrons of the school make every effort to build up the high school enrollment to a point where it can maintain the average daily attendance of 60 students on which a three-teacher high school is based. In this connection he said the elementary school attendance should be improved from the first grade up, adding that on the basis of the number of elementary school children residing in this district, Highlands should have a high school of 100 students.

Mr. Summer remarked that the attendance in the elementary school was lower the past year than it should have been, and that many failures were due to poor attendance.

Plan Annual Museum Meet On August 30

The annual meeting of the Highlands Museum and Biological Laboratory will be held in the museum Saturday afternoon, August 30, at 3:30 o'clock. All members and friends of the museum are invited to attend.

Reports on the year's work by the resident director of the laboratory, the director of the museum, and the officers of the institution will be made. Suggestions and plans for future activities also will be received at the meeting.

Trustees for next year will be elected. A meeting of the trustees will follow the general session.

The membership campaign for this year is now under way, headed by Miss Thelma Howell. Besides helping with the work of the museum and laboratory, members receive, free, all publications of the institution.

Now completing its seventeenth consecutive year of work, the Highlands Museum and Biological Laboratory is a unique institution, devoted to biological research, nature study, and preservation of mountain culture.

Apart from institutional fees paid by the contributing universities, it is supported entirely by citizens and residents of Highlands, and other public-spirited persons.

To Show Audubon Movie Friday Night

The final entertainment feature of the Highlands Museum will be the showing of an official Audubon Kodachrome movie by Alexander Sprunt, Jr., at the museum at 8 o'clock Friday night. Mr. Sprunt is on leave from the Audubon Society, having received a Guggenheim award for the purpose of writing a book on the birds of South Carolina.

Those who heard Mr. Sprunt last year and saw the film say that the occasion will be delightful. A small admission of 25 cents will be charged to defray expenses.

FLOWER SHOW IS FEATURED BY DAHLIAS

Sweepstakes In Annual Event Again Won By Mrs. Michael

Featuring mountain-grown dahlias in great brilliance and profusion, table settings of delightful design and color, and original creations built around special motifs, the fourth annual Highlands Flower Show proved to be the finest and richest yet held.

Sweepstakes prize was won for the second year in succession by Mrs. A. B. Michael. Running a close second was Mrs. J. K. Stoddard.

The dahlias ranged from mammoth whites, reds, bronzes, and purples to dainty pompoms in many shades, presented either as specimens or tastefully arranged in decorations. Also to be seen were striking examples of cactus dahlias, semi-cactus, decorative and orchid dahlias with their oddly twisted and colored petals.
