Luncheon equipment, school ground improvements, and playground equipment were cited as among the things needed by the school.

Commenting on the average layman's "woeful ignorance" of school administration, Mr. Houk cited figures on what the state is spending on schools in Macon County, and remarked that "public education has become big business—it is the biggest business in the county." He reviewed school progress in this county in recent years, and criticized what he said is a widespread tendency of people to ask much and give little. He explained that, if this county's school building program should be started now, the schools would get only about 60 cents on the dollar of what originally was planned.

He concluded by remarking that a parent-teacher association can be of most service to a community by bringing about a spirit of understanding between teachers and parents.

The Rev. Hoyt Evans conducted the devotional. Mrs. John Bulgin, secretary, reported for the executive committee. Mr. Finley introduced the new teachers, and Mrs. Lester Henderson presented the new parents. W. G. Crawford's eighth grade room had the largest number of parents and teachers present.

Following the meeting, a tea honoring the teachers, was given by the hospitality committee.
