Vegetable Freaks Of Siamese Twin Type Are Expected

This was a good year for twins in the vegetable kingdom, judging by freaks recently brought to The Press office.

A few days ago Crawford Shepherd, of Franklin, Route 4, brought in a Ben Davis apple—or apples. It appears to be two apples grown together, and has two blossom ends. But the Siamese twin fruit hung by a single stem. The fruit was found on the Bailey place in Haywood county, where Mr. Shepherd was employed as a picker.

A couple of days later Wade Burnette, of Norton, just across the line in Jackson county, exhibited a similar freak in the apple line, found in Dr. Edgar Angel's orchard on Snow Bird moun-

tain, a twin cabbage. The cabbage, which was grown by Mr. Burnette, grew together, as a single head, about half-way, and then split into two.

A new method of processing fresh cut green alfalfa promises to open industrial outlets for such alfalfa products as proteins and the pigments or coloring materials.

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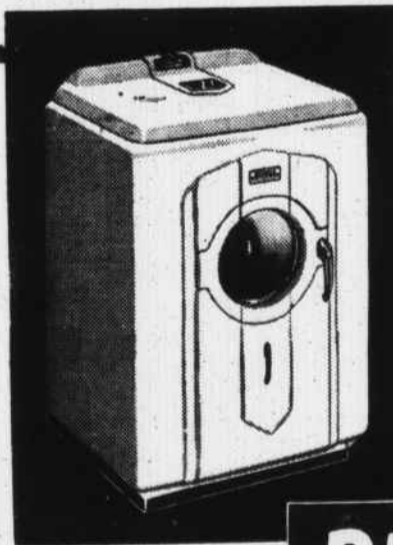
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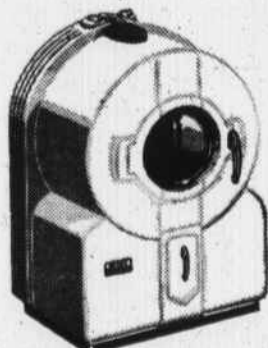
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
