The ceremony was performed by Dr.

Angus N. Gordon, of Louisville, assisted by the Rev. Glover Daniel, of Shelbyville.

The rostrum and choir-loft of the church were decorated with arrangements of white chrysanthemums, palms and ferns, interspersed with lighted tapers in branched candelabra. Preceding the ceremony, a program of wedding music was presented by Mrs. Harmon Nash, organist.

Charles Veazey Rainwater, father of the bridegroom, acted

as best man. Groomsmen were C. Veazey Rainwater, Jr., and Crawford J. V. Rainwater, of Pensacola, Robert Leonard Franklin, of Beaumont, Tex. and James Kingston Walters, Clifford Logan Walters and Carroll Thomas Eddie, of Shelbyville.

She wore a white faille taffeta gown made with puffed sleeves, tight bodice, and bouffant skirt with bustle back and deep ruffle at the hem, worn over crinolin hoops, long white gloves and a mantilla of French illusion woven with white faille taffeta roses. She carried a bouquet of American Beauty roses tied with red satin streamers.
