Mr. Kersten requests assistance in finding a relative of his and indirectly asks for assistance in the form of food or clothing.

Mayor Angel said that the letter seemed very similar to letters reported to have been re-ceived by Mayor C. E. Morgan, of Asheville, in which the writers in every case first presented a strong human interest appeal, mentioned great priva-tions, and asked for help.

Following are excerpts from Mr. Kersten's letter which was addressed: "To the Mayor in Franklin, North Carolina".

"Please excuse us for writing you but may I kindly beg r your assistance in clarifying matter in which I am very ch interested. In 1928 a c of my wife Mr. Heinrich went to America and hed himself, as far as I near or in your town. We regret At very much that our last letter and news have gone astray due to the war and that we can give you only a very few catch words

"My wife and I, myself, to-gether with our 16 months old aby are suffering very much inder the present living conritions in Germany and that we are greatly in need of food' and clothing.

Motor Vehicle Inspection Law Auto News

(This is one of a series of articles designed to acquaint the motoring public with the requirements of the the requirements of the Motor Motor Vehicle Inspection program which goes into cf-fect this month.)

RALIEGH, N. C .- The Motor Vehicle Mechanical Inspection. Program, which was designed to save lives by preventing needless accidents caused by faulty and defective equipment on vehicles, will get under way on January 12 with the opening of lanes in five North Carolina cities-Raleigh, Durham, Elizabeth City, Greenville, and Wilmington.

One week later on January 19, six additional lanes will open in Greensboro, High Point, Char-lotte, Winston-Salem, Fayetteville, and Gastonia.

Suitable property has been ob-tained in these cities for setting up the inspection lanes, and all the testing equipment will be installed by the opening dates Officials of the Department of Motor Vehicles, which will administer the Inspection program, are urging all motorists in these areas to take their cars in for inspection as soon as the lanes are open. It is anticipated that it will

take around 15 minutes to in . spect each vehicle as the program first gets underway. How-ever, when inspectors become experienced, it, will prol more ably take only five minutes

The Inspection Law is a part of the Highway Safety Act passthe 1947 General ed by Assembly. It requires that all motor vehicles registered in North Carolina must be inspected once during 1948 and twice a year thereafter. Motor Vehicles include cars, trucks, trailers, semitrailers, motorcycles, and motor bikes.

The program provides for the establishment of 40 lanes throughout the State, four of which will serve as emergency An educational program, de-or replacement units. Opening signed to assist in curbing the dates for all lanes have not yet been announced, and it is not the state's population and the attendant vice, crime and in-stitutional expense such in-crease involves, has been presently known how long those opening on the 12th and 19th will remain in operation in their announced localities. Part of the answer, the league says, is selective sterilization of the mentally unfit through more complete enforce-ment of the provisions of the state's sterilization law. More than 40,000 copies of pamphlet containing questions and answers about the operation of this statute are being mailed to various groups in North Carolina.

The simple body. operation merely closes the tiny passages through which the life-producing cells must travel."

While medical science is learning more about ways to cure some types of insanity, feeblemindedness "is not a disease and therefore cannot be cured. Feebleminded patients are born with defective mental equipment which cannot be be changed," explains the pamphlet.

"North Carolina statutes provide special legal safeguards to prevent any abuse of this im-portant law. A careful investigation is made by the heads of certain institutions or by county superintendents of welfare, who make their recommendations to the State Eugenics Board. If the board finds that sterilization is indicated, it can order the operation performed at public expense. If a patient or his family feels that the op-eration should not be performed, appeal to the courts is pos-sible."

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
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
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




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
