GIFTS RECEIVED BY LABORATORY

Research Fund Has Been Established, Board Announces

Important and significant gifts to the Highlands Biological Laboratory was announced this week by the executive board of the laboratory. Three nationally known concerns have made donations to the laboratory, and a research fund has been established.

In making the announcement for the executive board, Miss Thelma Howell said that the American Bemberg corporation, the Crown Cork and Seal company, and the Southern States Iron Roofing company have made substantial donations, and that the Ward's Natural Science Establishment has created a research fund.

The Ward fellowship will enable the laboratory to extend its services to a deserving group, Miss Howell said. She pointed out that D. L. Gamble, president of Ward's Natural Science Establishment, feels that too often gifted students do not have the financial means of developing their research ability, and for that reason the Ward Fellowship fund has been established. Preference under this fellowship is to be given to zoologists.

The gifts were obtained as a part of the campaign currently being conducted by the executive board of the laboratory for funds for the developmental program approved by the trustees last July. Miss Howell said that funds received from the following members were invaluable in conducting the campaign: Mrs. Clark Howell, Sr., Charles V. Rainwater, Sr., Dr. J. Ray Cable, Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Farnsworth, Mr. and Mrs. J. Harvey Trice, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Monroe, Mrs. Clara Many, Dr. K. W. Hunt, Mrs. Robert Hiden, John F. Branson, Dr. and Mrs. Ralph Sargent, and Miss Gertrude Harbison.

According to Miss Howell, the executive board is exerting every effort to raise the funds for the expansion program from industry and foundations. Two handsome pamphlets have been prepared and sent to industrial concerns currently supporting research.

Now under preparation is a brochure giving the history and needs of the laboratory.
