Mrs. Robert (Bob) Lee and son, Bobbie, have gone to Fairmont, Ga., for a visit to Mrs. Lee's mother.

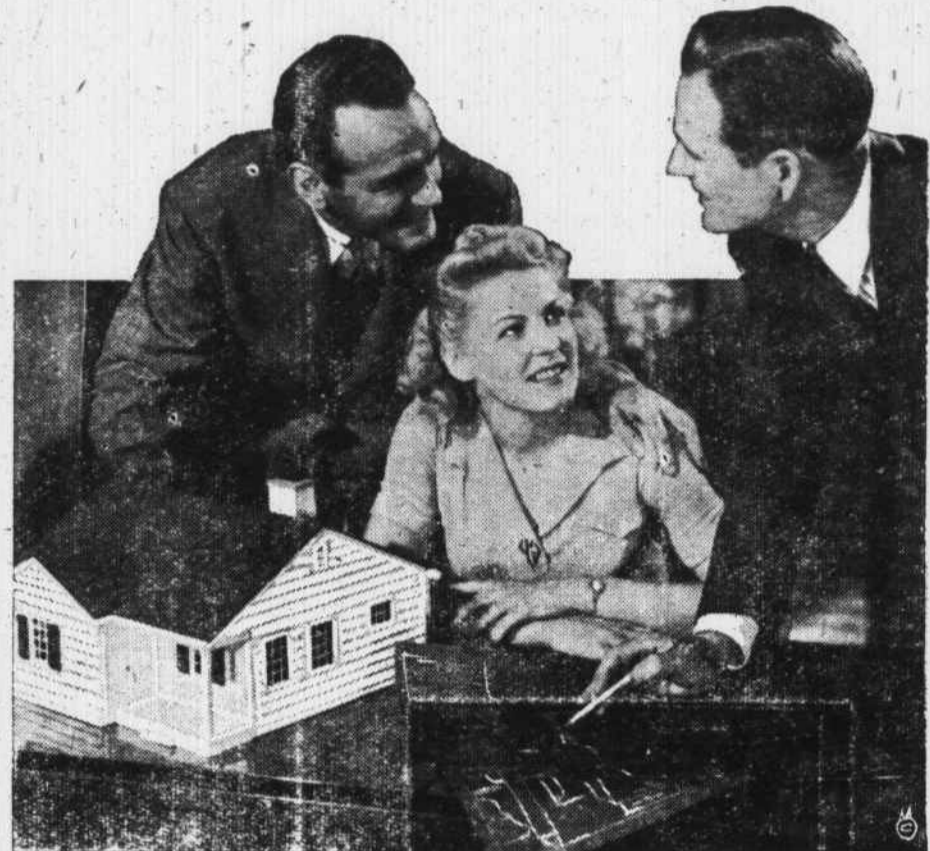
