### Terrapin Brood Stock On N. C. Island Released

MOREHEAD CITY.—The terrapin brood stock on Pivers Island which for nearly a half century has been used for propagating of diamond backs are being liberated. Reason for this, funds which formerly came from the state and federal government for propagation purposes are no longer available.

Since shortly after the turn of the present century, more than 250,000 baby terrapins have been hatched in the propagation pens of Pivers Island under supervision of U. S. Fish and Wildlife officials. The young released and as a result, the diamond back terrapin, almost extinct during the 1890s, has made a comeback in Atlantic coast waters.

### Here's How You Prove Financial Responsibility

RALEIGH.—Are you waiting to get your driver's license reinstated after a revocation or suspension?

If so, you'd better start inquiring into the state's financial responsibility law.

It is estimated that at present there are about 900 persons in North Carolina who expect to have their driving licenses reinstated within the next month. But unless they start working at least 30 days ahead toward showing proof of financial responsibility, they may have to wait longer, according to the Department of Motor Vehicles.

Department officials are urging motorists who are temporarily deprived of their driving privileges to look into the financial responsibility act immediately—write the Highway Safety division of the department if necessary—to make arrangements about securing "proof."

How do you go about establishing proof of financial responsibility? The law states that it may be shown by one of the following methods:

1. Secure a standard automobile liability insurance policy and have the insurance company issuing your policy file with the Highway Safety division, Department of Motor Vehicles, a certificate known as Form SR22, showing coverage for the vehicle or vehicles for which proof is required under the law. If no vehicle is owned or registered by you, then the certificate must show that you have been issued a "named operator's policy."

2. File with the Highway Safety division a surety or real estate bond in the amount of \$11,000 with respect to each vehicle for which proof is required. Bond forms may be secured from the division.

3. Deposit with the Highway Safety division cash or securities in the amount of \$11,000 with respect to each vehicle for which proof is required.

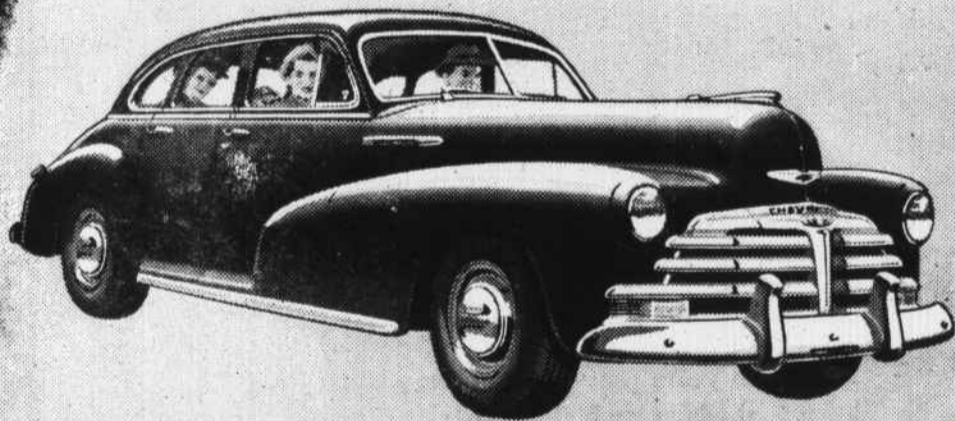
