MUCH INTEREST IN ARTIFICIAL BREEDING HERE

Edd Bradley To Handle Work; Fee Reduced To \$5 Per Cow

It is very gratifying to note the increased interest in the artificial breeding program that recently has been started in Macon County.

Due to this increase, and due to Dr. O. H. Burnside's increased practice, it has been necessary to train another man to carry on the breeding work. Edd Bradley, of Iotla, has taken this training and is now ready to render a great service to all people of Macon County who have one or more milk cows.

Through the cooperation of E. J. Whitmire and his G. I. program, it has been possible to reduce the service fee from \$8.75 to \$5. For this fee, a cow may be bred for three times, if necessary, at no additional cost.

Only semen from registered and proven Guernsey, Jersey and Holstein bulls is used. This means that in most all cases a heifer calf, if properly cared for, should develop into a better cow than her dam. Lifetime membership in the Macon County Dairy Breeders Association is only \$1. Any person wishing to contact Mr. Bradley may do so by calling the county agent's office during the week, and Reid's Esso Service station on Saturday afternoon and Sunday.

Artificial breeding, along with proper care and feeding, will do more to improve our dairy cattle and milk production than any one thing we can do. Join the association now and take advantage of this wonderful opportunity.

home demonstration agent for the State college extension service.

"It's just as important to conserve food this year as it was any year during the war," Miss Current said. "Canning should be done by a budget and according to the number in the family."

Now is a good time to count jars and buy new ones if necessary, the home agent continued. There will be need for a water bath canner with rack. The gauge on the pressure canner should be checked for accuracy and safety, and jars, caps, and rings should be in readiness when strawberries, cherries, garden peas, and early corn ripen.

The home demonstration division of the N. C. Agricultural Extension service will be glad to supply a canning bulletin to anyone who writes for it, Miss Current said.

Aid In Soil Work Sought By Farmers

With the closing for signing 1948 Farm Plans a summary has been compiled showing that 1,550 Macon County farmers have requested assistance in improving and conserving their farm soil this year.

By the use of limestone, phosphate, winter cover crops, and permanent pasture management practices, this number of farms will be in better condition at the end of 1948, provided the owners take full advantage of the opportunities offered through the AAA's soil conservation program.

The total money value of the practices requested by these farmers is more than \$62,000 while the county allocation at present is only \$22,000. It is expected that adjustment upwards in this allocation will be possible or that money will be transferred from idle farms before the end of the year.
