State College Scholarships Of \$100 Each Offered

Twenty awards of \$100 each will be made to graduates of North Carolina high school; who wish to study either agriculture or vocational agriculture at North Carolina State college, starting in Septemor, 1948. These scholarships are intended for farm boys who need financial aid in beginning their college education, and are made possible by grants from the Sears-Roebuck foundation. The scholarships will be

awarded primarily on the basis of need, with consideration also being given to scholastic record in high school, participa-tion in 4- HClub or FFA projects, and other community ac-Veterans are eligible,

especially those who are married and have children. One-half of the award will be

paid to recipients on October 1 and can be used for the payment of any college expenses, including board and room. The second installment will be paid on January 15, provided the student has made a successful record during the fall term.

Applications must be filed by July, 1948, and announcement of awards will be made soon after that date. For application blanks write to Dean of Agri culture, North Carolina State College, Raleigh, N. C.

N. C. Velerans Body Urges Supervision Of School Program

By its recent protest to the Veterans administration against what it charged is a lack of adequate supervision of education and training of former servicemen under the GI Bill, the North Carolina Veterans com-mission led the way in pointing out the dangers of exploitation in the nation-wide veterans program.

Without proper supervision, the program is in danger of being discontinued or drastically curtailed, the North Carolina commission said.

"We have been justifiably proud of the entire veterans program in this state up to now", the commission wrote North Carolina senators and congressmen, R. S. Hulme, Asheville, the commission's dis-trict officer, reported. "However we view with much concern the misuse and deteriora-tion which inevitably will result without supervision of some kind.'

The commission urged the Veterans administration "to review its decision to abandon the responsibility of supervision of the on-the-job training and educational program . ucational program . . . and that such responsibility be resumed immediately"


