# **Timely Farm Questions**

Q. Is it advisable to raise the first calf of a heifer?

A. It makes absolutely no difference in the quality of the heifer calf whether she is the first or a later one. Sometimes the first calf may be slightly smaller than caives born later but even this is not necessarily true. At any rate, it would be affect the animal's future production.

Q. How much aging does bee need before it goes into inozer locker storage?

A. Aging the freshly slaughtered carcass for a week or 10 days in a chill room mercase the natural tenderness of the meat. Longer aging is often used, but it allows for the de velopment of state odors from bag.

If properly washed and thoroughly rinsed and sun-dried, handkerchiefs should need no bleaching which is apt to be hard on the fabric. Boiling should be necessary only in case of colds or contagious diseases.

Pin handkerchiefs to the line on top of a towel and least them only until dry.




