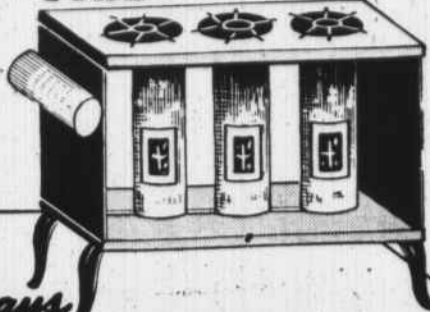

South's Cotton

Farmers Are Reducing Acreage

The South's cotton farmers, through better management and higher yields, have been able to reduce their cotton acreage sharply during the past 10 years, says C. Brice Ratchford, in charge of farm management for the State college extension service.

The sharpest reduction, he said, has occurred in Oklahoma, where the crop has decreased from an average of 2,197,000 acres during 1935-39 to 1,074,000 acres in 1946. This is a 51.1 per cent reduction.

Using the same base years (1935-39), there has been a 45.7 per cent decrease in Georgia, and a 39.3 per cent decrease in North Carolina. The decrease in Texas has been 22.3 per cent, and in Mississippi it has been

19.0 per cent.

Through better use of land and better cultural practices, growers have been able to increase their yields per acre. Therefore, Mr. Ratchford asserted, total production of cotton has not decreased nearly so much as total acreage.

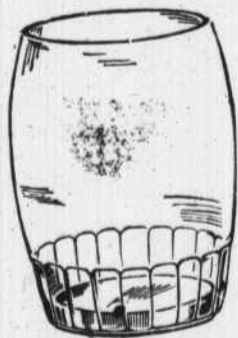

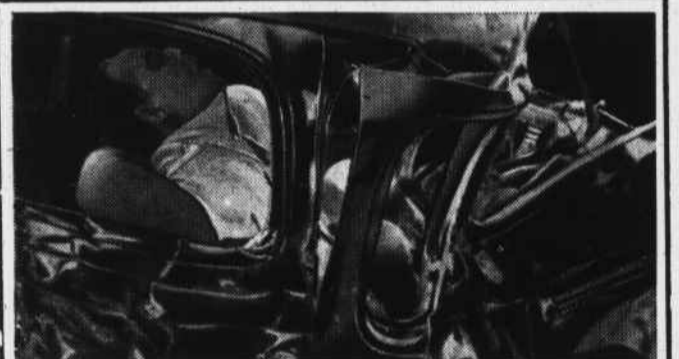
