Planning New Kitchen?

Then Here's Step-Saving Design That May Interest You

Persons planning to build or remodel their kitchens will be interested in a step-saving kitchen designed by U. S. home economists.

Working drawings for this kitchen are available at the home demonstration office, in the Agricultural building here, it was announced this week. The demonstration office also has a bulletin illustrating the new kitchen.

Extra blueprints, it was explained, may be obtained for a small fee from Extension Agricultural Engineering, State College Station, Raleigh.

Special features of this streamlined farm kitchen include:

Double-deck flour bins — just above the mixing center.

Revolving corner cupboards—save space and steps.

Garbage short-cut-in a convenient non-stoop garbage disposal arrangement.

Counter bins—for fruits and vegetables, placed between sink and windows.

Sliding doors—back of serving counter saves many steps, make for quicker service.

State Needs

To Raise 500,000 More Turkeys For Own Use

If Tar Heels ate as much turkey as other Americans, it would take more than twice the state's present production to meet the demand, Lee W. Herrick, Jr., extension turkey specialist at State college, declares in a new 16-page bulletin, which is now available for distribution.

The present production rate of less than 400,000 turkeys annually might well be increased, Mr. Herrick says. On the basis of average national consumption, we need 893,000 birds for our own needs, he adds.

The bulletin entitled "Growing Turkeys," gives detailed information on the production of turkeys by the range system and the total confinement system. The range method Mr. Herrick considers more practical for commercial growers in North Carolina, since grazing crops, which reduce feed costs, may be produced on a year-round basis.

Sanitation and good management practices are emphasized as the best means of avoiding costly losses from diseases. "A clean range," the bulletin states, "is one on which there have been no turkeys or chickens in the past two years. Poultry droppings spread as fertilizer or drainage may also infect a range."

The publication contains several illustrations which show how to build feeders, waterers, roosting poles, and fences.

GROUP'S REPORT ANALYZES N. C. FARM SITUATION

Copies Of 44-Page 'Farm Program' Available Without Charge

What's wrong with North Carolina agriculture? What needs to be done to improve it?

Answers to these questions, which are of far-reaching consequence to the state, are to be found in a 44-page report just issued by the State College Extension service. Entitled "A Farm Program for North Carolina," the report contains the long-term agricultural recommendations drawn up by a committee of specialists at the request of Governor Cherry.

The committee, headed by Dr. J. H. Hilton, dean of the State college school of agriculture and director of the North Carolina Experiment station, was given the task of making an overall study of the state's agricultural ailments and recommending a long-range corrective program. The suggested program, adopted unanimously by the specialists, was submitted to Governor Cherry last April, and is now available to the public in printed form for the first time.

Part I of the report gives a brief analysis of North Carolina agriculture as it is now. Part II presents the recommendations for the future. Part III tells how to get the job done. Much pertinent information is presented in chart form.

Urge Parents

To Have Children Ready For School Opening

With the time approaching when the schools will reopen, the county health office this week suggested that parents should see that their children are ready for school, physically, when the bell rings on the opening day.

They can do this, it was suggested, by having the child given a complete physical examination, and any defects corrected having a dentist attend to the child's teeth; having the child's eyes examined, if that is advised following the general examination; and checking on immunizations to see that the required shots have been given and that the child has been given the maximum protection against communicable diseases.

And teachers were urged to have the physical examinations required of them before school gets under way. Since a chest X-ray is required as a part of this examination, it was suggested that teachers take advantage of the mobile X-ray unit that is now in this county.




