

Franklin reached the ten-yard line with less than a minute remaining, when Archer stepped back and fired his first pass of the game, over the left side of his line. White, who was



A. Tobacco was the earliest, profitable export crop from the Americas. Spaniards first ship ped it commercially to Europe from what is now the United States in 1531. A. The answer is no. Tobacco is one of the most exacting of all plants. For most crops, the type of machine that places a band of fertilizer at one side of the row gives results just as satisfactory as from a band on each side. But with most types of tobacco, research shows that a one-sided application frequently produces onesided growth effects.
