Is Let For Hospital Electrical Work

The contract for electrical work for the Highlands Community Hospital, Inc., has been given to the firm of T. N. Hall and C. A. Wilson, according to an announcement made this week by S. C. Russell chairman of the board of trustees.

Mr. Russell said work is progressing rapidly on the building, and that with an average of three full working days a week, the 15 men who are working regularly should have the roof on not later than January 15.

Each of the men who worked last week donated a full day's work, Mr. Russell said.

The building material, and electrical and heating equipment supplied to the hospital at cost by Highlands Hardware company, and Highlands Engineering company, is the equivalent of donations approximating \$1,500, Mr. Russell said.
