free to say what they will pay for the various classes of milk, as the law gives the commissioner no authority in the mat-ter of prices, either wholesale or retail.

Calling the Asheville hearing was Commissioner Ballentine's first step toward carrying out a policy he has announced of de-veloping an integrated system of official milk classes for the entiré state on as uniform a basis as possible. Earlier he had

The Franklin Cub pack, Boy Scouts of America, will hold its August meeting at Arrowood Glade Sunday at 4 p. m.






