In this spirit, the North Carolina General Assembly this Spring, echoing the wishes of the people, established the Malt Beverage Division of the North Carolina ABC Board.

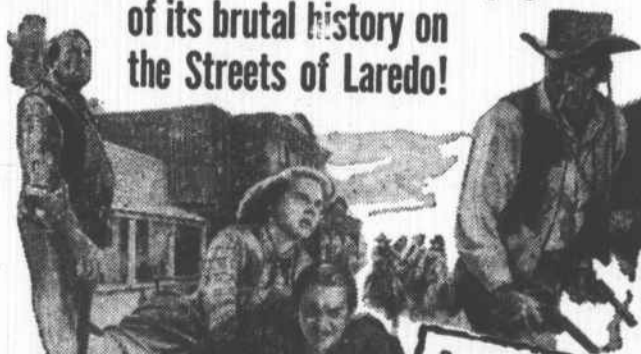
