COUNTY INCOME FROM HATCHING EGGS \$400,000

resenting between 60,000 and 70,000 laying hens. The meeting, one of the series being held in this end of the state, went on record as asking the State Department of Agriculture to establish a poultry blood testing and disease diagnostic laboratory in this region. It also was decided to call a second meeting to discuss the proposal that a marketing organization be set up.

Due to its cool climate and the amount of moisture in the air, this southwestern end of North Carolina is especially adapted to production of eggs with a high hatchability, it was brought out, and I. O. Schaub, director of the N. C. Extension service, suggested establishing a poultry marketing organization in each of the six western counties and then federating the six organizations in a Western North Carolina unit to set up standards for hatching eggs and to market the eggs under a copyrighted name.

The meeting, attended by about 90 Macon County farmers and a few from Jackson County, was opened by County Agent S. W. Mendenhall, and Mr. Parrish led the discussion. Other specialists present included Dr. R. S. Dearstyne, head of the poultry department of N. C. State college; Hugh Harris, assistant N. C. commissioner of agriculture; L. J. Fourie, in charge of the department's poultry work; R. W. Shoffner, district farm agent; and Howard Clapp, head of the Mountain Experiment station, near Waynesville.

In opening the discussion, Mr. Parrish emphasized that the poultrymen, in planning their program, should anticipate four problems: Over-production; inefficient production; diseases; and marketing. Mr. Parrish also stressed the importance of the poultrymen's producing hatching eggs that will grow the type of chicken the market demands. Dr. Dearstyne discussed poultry diseases, and Mr. Fourie talked on blood testing and the requirements in regard to vaccination.

"A prize of \$20 will be given for the best article, whether it is written by a school boy or girl. In addition to the first prize, a \$10 prize will be given for the best article written by a school girl, and a prize of \$10 for the best article written by a school boy.

"The following rules will be observed:

"1. Any school boy or girl of Macon County is eligible to enter the contest.

"2. The subject must be some era, event, institution, building or person of historic interest to Macon County. Biographies of people who are now living will not be accepted. There are no restrictions as to the length of the article.

"3. The source of all information must be given. It is best to give this at the end of the article. If statements made are based upon rumor, this must be pointed out and the origin of the rumor must be given as accurately as possible.

"4. All entries must be typewritten and mailed to Miss Cecile Gibson, Secretary of Macon County Historical Society, not later than December 1, 1949. The awards will be made at 8 o'clock p. m. on December 19, 1949.

"5. Entries must be made in the name of some particular school child and not by a school or class or grade in a school. "The society is availing itself of the columns of The Press to get this information to the officials and teachers of Macon County with the hope that you will give it your support."
