




Shedd Sunday led officers to the bodies of the girl and her ister, Jo Ann, 8, at a spot near

Picked up for questioning atter the body of John Boyter, 38, of Walhalla, S. C., father of the two girls, was found by a hunter just across the state line in Georgia August 9, Shedd Sunday morning finally con-fessed, authorities said, and and then led them to the place, on the Highlands-Dillard road where the bodies of the girls were found. The triple s'ayings occurred August 3, authorities

Boyter's body was riddled with shotgun shot, and the two girls had been strangled.

Shedd was removed from the Gainesville, Ga. jail, where he was being held, and brought to North Carolina Tuesday by Sodocket when the Magon County licitor Thad D. Bryson, Jr. and Sgt. T. A. Sandlin, of the N. C. State Highway patrol, and was placed in an undisclosed jail to await trial.

The move came after Solicitor Bryson had conferred with Solicitor General Winton Owen, of Toccoa, Ga., about the mur-ders, and the Georgia officials released Shedd to North Carolina for trial. Solicitor Bryson and Sgt. Sandlin has been aiding Georgia and South Carolina officials in investigating the triple slaying. Meanwhile, Judge J.
