Colorful, Romantic Bavaria Is Land of Christmas-Card Beauty

If you want to visit in a romantic, colorful land, head for Bavaria. All year round, its towns and mountain villages, with their steeples, castles, steep-roofed houses and mountainous backgrounds, are like a series of woodcuts come to life. But especially in winter is Bavaria attractive, for then the deep snows that blanket the towns and majestic Alpine peaks turn it into a Christmas-card fairyland.

Magnificent scenery, fine music, animated cafe life and warm hospitality are to be found all along the Bavarian Alps, from Lake Constance via Kempton, Toelz, Oberammergau the Passion Play village (2,765 feet high), Garmisch-Partenkirchen, and all the way east to Berchtesgaden.

Munich, Bavaria's capital and the traditional German center of art, is more lively than ever in winter, for it is the gateway to the great chain of lofty mountains that extends along the German-Austrian frontier. A ride of an hour or two from Munich by train, bus or car takes you to the Bavarian Alps where breath-taking scenery delights nature lovers and camera fans, and the peaks provide some of the finest winter sports areas in Europe, skiing, skating, and bobsledding.

Garmisch-Partenkirchen, the scene of the 1936 winter Olympics, is one of the most popular snow resorts in Germany. The twin towns of Garmisch and Partenkirchen, magnificently situated at an altitude of 2,300 feet, have full, modern equipment that can compete with any in Europe. The Olympic ice stadium, with its 12,000 square feet of ice, is one of the best to be found anywhere. The Olympic bobsled run offers competitions over 1,750 yards, and ski run at the Olympic ski stadium is the first in Europe to be built entirely of steel.

The resort has three cable car lines and six ski lifts. Scenery of incredible beauty may be viewed from the window of the cogwheel train that runs up to the Schneefernerhaus hotel at the top of the Zugspitz. Among the good buys available in this region are locally-made Bavarian velvet hats, leather trousers, mountain boots and sport equipment. Hotel accommodations are plentiful and good. There are more than 4,000 beds, and the daily cost, like that in most other Bavarian resorts, is 50 cents to \$2, while room and board vary between \$1.75 and \$5.

Dozens of other winter sports centers to the south of Munich—such as popular Reit in Winkl, at 2,335-4,000 feet—offer a full program of special events from December to March. In the southeastern corner of Bavaria, near Bad Reichenhall and Salzburg, the country is surrounded by nine groups of mountains, including the high and steep Watzmann, the Hochkalter (with the Blaueis, Bavaria's only glacier), the Untersberg (locale of many fairy tales), the Steinerne Meer and the Hochkonig.

Among the leading winter sports resorts in southern Bavaria are beautiful Tagernsee and its district; Lenggries, situated in a scenic valley surrounded by high mountains at a height varying from 2,335 to 6,000 feet; Bayrischzell, a well-

equipped center; Mittenwald, near Garmisch-Partenkirchen; and Obersdorf, beautifully situated near the Nebelhorn.

A visit to some of Bavaria's numerous towns is the natural complement to a winter sports vacation. The mid-winter months are the best time to go to the opera, concerts, artshows and museums. Shopping has again become exciting in Germany, and few tourists manage to leave without buying a German camera and photographic equipment or such popular items as leather goods, chinaware, porcelain and wood carvings.

Hotel accommodations in most Bavarian towns are good and further establishments are being opened every month. One of the latest is the famous Koenigshof, on Munich's Karlsplatz, whose owners claim it to be the most modern in Germany. Top prices for room and full board in Germany's hotels are about \$5 a day, but in most towns it is actually considerably less.
