
the sale of Georgia milk within her borders it would seriously damage the agricultural economy of Rabun county.

It is the opinion of those signing the resolution that the regulation now being enforced by the agriculture department of Georgia is in violation of interstate commerce regulations and the Constitution of the United States, and inasmuch as such regulations "do unreasonably restrain and paralize commerce between the State of Georgia and the State of North Carolina", such rules and regu-lations should be "revoked, abandoned, and made null and void".

Erwin Patton, of the Nantahala dairy, said this week that, to his knowledge, Mr. Linder had not withdrawn his order and therefore the dairy here is not delivering milk in Rabun county. He added, however, that many customers there are driving to Franklin to obtain their milk.

MODERN AERIAL WARRIOR—Surrounded by a multitude of necessary instruments and him-self superbly equipped for high-speed, high-altitude aerial combat, this jet fighter pilot (left) has a minimum of space for the charts by which he navigates his F-84 jet fighter and makes safe landings when his mission is completed. It's the job of the Aeronautical Chart Service to provide him with charts of the right kinds and sizes. Right, Flight Leader Capt. James Brooks explains to Wingman Lieut. Heckman the instrument let-down procedure at their destination. These jet pilots examine a new, experimental type of jet arrival let-down chart which provides all the information necessary for safe landings despite its midget size. Only 4½ by 7 inches, it fits into the easily reached leg pocket of the pilot's flying suit, a great advantage in the limited space of a jet cockpit.
