The petition was sent to Senator R. S. Jones in Raleigh. He told The Press, in response to a long distance telephone inquiry, however, that he would take no action on it. What he received, he explained, was a petition addressed not to him, but to the Highlands town board. He would not introduce a bill for an ABC election in Highlands, he said, except upon the request of the Highlands board, since that board is the authority which should know best what the wishes of the people of Highlands are.

2. More than nine dairymen in Rabun county are selling whole milk in North Carolina. This milk is inspected by Georgia state inspectors and accepted by North Carolina.

3. North Carolina inspectors examine and check the Nantahala dairy.

4. If North Carolina stopped the sale of Georgia milk within her borders it would seriously damage the agricultural economy of Rabun county.

5. It is the opinion of those signing the resolution that the regulation now being enforced by the agriculture department of Georgia is in violation of interstate commerce regulations and the Constitution of the United States, and inasmuch as such regulations "do unreasonably restrain and paralyze commerce between the State of Georgia and the State of North Carolina", such rules and regulations should be "revoked, abandoned, and made null and void."

Erwin Patton, of the Nantahala dairy, said this week that, to his knowledge, Mr. Linder had not withdrawn his order and therefore the dairy here is not delivering milk in Rabun county. He added, however, that many customers there are driving to Franklin to obtain their milk.

These jet pilots examine a new, experimental type of jet arrival let-down chart which provides all the information necessary for safe landings despite its modest size. Only 4 1/2 by 7 inches, it fits into the easily reached leg pocket of the pilot's flying suit, a great advantage in the limited space of a jet cockpit.
