

The entire along each side of the branch farm is now fenced with woven which he has seeded to clover and grass. This enables him to wire, and enough cross fences built of the same type wire to enable Mr. Smith to have 15 cultivate his corn with his tractor and not break any of it in turning. Also he mows this grass different fields for rotational grazing. Mr. Smith spent most of one winter clearing useless and clover three or four times a year and saves it for hay. At the same time he is able to land of shrubs and trees for new pasture; and cleaning ald-ers along the branches to re-claim good crop land. Mr. Smith mow his branch banks with his tractor and save much time and labor with a bush hook. Mr. Smith made the stateis following a good farm man-agement practice along the ment that he has not made any cash money in the three years he has operated this farm. However, he feels that the increase in value of his farm would compensate him for money in-

vested and he now has the farm in a high state of culti-vation and buildings in good repair. He feels that his only problem now is maintenance of what he has. From here on he is confident of a good return on his investment. Mr. Smith is a unit demonstration farmer.
