For instance, last year farmers were asked to notify the county agent's office, or any other agricultural worker, if they thought they had corn that would yield 100 bushels per acre so this corn could be checked and due credit given to the farmer and county. Many farmers made 100 bushels or more per acre but none of these farmers asked for an estimation to be made; therefore, this county had no 100 bushel yields



to report and no farmers were eligible to attend the annual banquet which is held in Asheville for the 100-bushel growers. Farmers were asked to report their improved pasture if they had one and one-half acres per animal unit. Only 63 farmers made this report when anyone riding through the county can very easily see that only a very small percentage of the farmers who qualified reported their pasture. Macon County, however, was designated as one of the ten best counties in the state and received the green pasture flag. No county in the state has been designated as an honor county as yet. To get this award 60 per cent of the farmers must have one and one-half acres of ladino and grass pasture per animal unit.  
Farmers who received the Green Pasture award for 1951 should report their pasture acreage again this year in order that the date may be changed from 1951 to 1952. All farmers who did not report last year but did have one and one-half acres of improved pastures per animal unit should not fail to report this year.  
Farmers who think that they have corn that will yield 100 bushels per acre should notify the county agent's office, or some other agricultural worker, so that the yield can be estimated.
