FARM SAFETY WEEK PLANNED

"Accidents caused by indifference and thoughtlessness continue to rob the nation of the lives and services of thousands of farm residents each year," said President Truman in a recent statement proclaiming the week of July 20-26 as National Farm Safety Week.

The President called on every farm owner and resident to cooperate in practicing effective safety measures. In his statement, he also said that the number of unnecessary casualties can be greatly reduced by exercising caution and effort on the part of every farm family in the nation.

The conservation of manpower and property is vital to national defense security, the President pointed out.

President Truman requested all organizations and persons interested in farm life to join in a campaign to develop farm safety habits and prevent needless accidents on the farm and elsewhere.

National Farm Safety Week is sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the National Fire Protection Association, the Farm Equipment Institute, the American Farm Bureau, Farmers union, National Grange, and other organizations interested in agriculture and rural life.
