Setser Qualifies As Carbine Expert In Japan Exercise

Sgt. Frederick Setser, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Setser, of Franklin, recently qualified as an expert by scoring 250 out of a possible 260 points during the annual carbine firing exercise held by the 2nd Transportation Major port with the Japan Logistical command in Yokohama, the army has announced.

The logistical unit handles supplies for the army, navy, and air force in Korea, Japan and other parts of the Far East.

Sgt. Setser, who enlisted in the army in 1949, was sent to the Far East in August, 1951, and is serving as non-commissioned officer in the officer records section at the port.

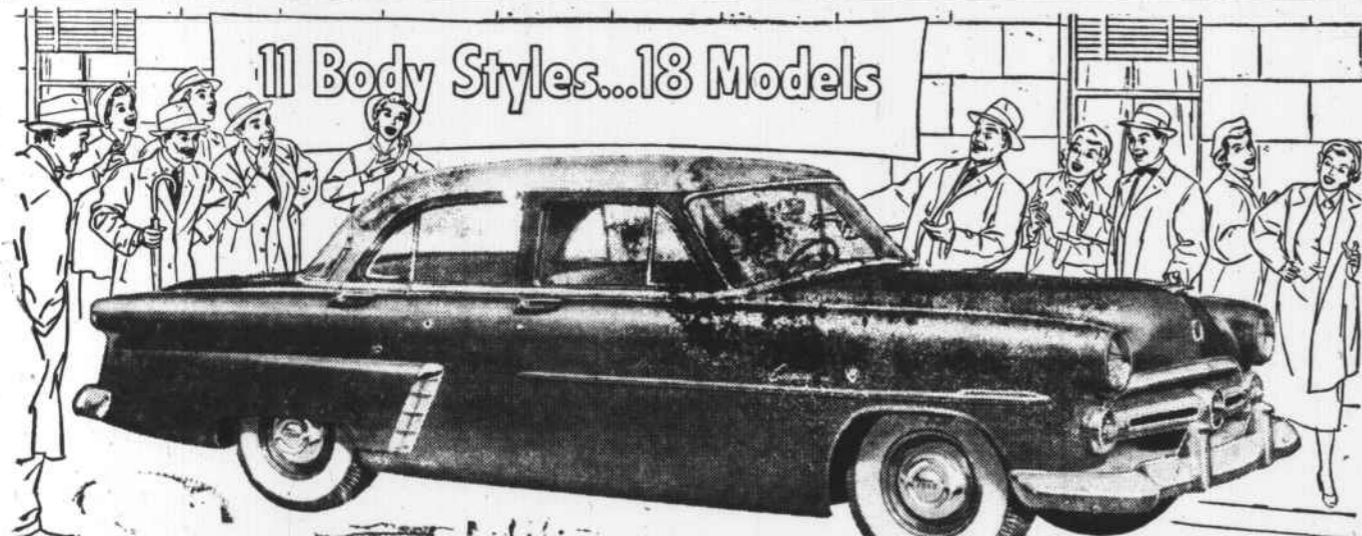
