The decorations, the wrappings, the ladies' favors, and even the food emphasized that this was a silver anniversary, while the Rotary colors of blue and gold also were to be found everywhere.

For the occasion, the club had Dr. C. Sylvester Green as guest speaker. Dr. Green, a one-time Rotary district governor, is executive vice-president of the Medical Foundation of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. He spoke on the genius, the energies, and the vision of Rotary.

Following the dinner, the club's huge birthday cake was brought in, and past presidents of the club were called upon to light the candles on it. The tinsel-wrapped "surprise" packages prepared by Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Gnuse, Jr., at each place, then were opened. Each contained a miniature birthday cake, surmounted by a tiny candle.
