State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Q. How can I prevent weed flavors in milk?

A. The best solution appears to be in eliminating such annual weeds as bitterweed, garlic and other forms of onions, by the development and use of better pastures and crops, according to L. W. Aurand, of the department of animal industry at N. C. State college.

Mr. Aurand also notes that such feeds as clover, lucerne, cabbages, etc. also give characteristic flavors to milk when fed just before milking. Several months for the removal of off-flavors have been studied but none give promise of providing a general solution to the off-flavor problem.

He says that the development of crops and pastures that will effectively compete with the

Mrs. Corinne J. Grimsley, family life extension specialist, of the State college division of home demonstration work, gives these guide posts to child's behavior:

1. Always look for the cause back of the child's behavior.
2. Be sure that the child has opportunities to succeed.
3. Be sure that the child has opportunities to feel important.
4. Over-look little irritating happenings. (Don't hear every bad word your child says or notice all of his grammatical mistakes.)
5. Parents must agree on methods of discipline. (Any difference should be settled away from the children.)
6. Place more emphasis on teaching children how to think rather than what to think.
7. Give praise when children earn it.
8. Give encouragement when children need it.
9. When possible, give reasons for requests.
10. Give a child an opportunity to talk with you privately.
11. Give a child an opportunity to explain.

12. Apologize when you have made a mistake.
13. Show self-control when dealing with a child.
14. Keep your voice calm.
15. Get the child's attention before you give instructions.

Go Slow — Danger Ahead
1. Don't expect all children to behave the same way or develop character at the same speed.
2. Never make promises which you do not expect to keep.
3. Never bribe a child to behave.
4. Never frighten a child to make him behave.
5. Guard against being critical of what children tell you, or acting shocked at what they tell you.
6. Don't jump at conclusions.
7. Don't use words which antagonize like "hurry" or "I told you so".
8. Never criticize a child in public.
9. Don't punish a child for something he does today and overlook the same thing tomorrow.

Approximately 174 burley tobacco growers in Macon County are eligible to vote in the referendum on burley tobacco marketing quotas on November 22, according to J. H. Enloe, Jr., chairman of the county Production Management committee.

The referendum is being held to determine, in accordance with the law, whether growers want quotas for three years; whether they want quotas for

weeds and prevent their attaining significant proportions seems to be the ultimate solution to off-flavors in milk.

Weed off-flavors occur chiefly in the winter and early spring. On many farms, either as a result of drought or overstocking or both, there is little grass of any sort, and weeds provide the only feed. As a result, according to Mr. Aurand, weed ingestion and the resulting off-flavor are quite common.

He notes recent claims to the effect that feeding certain mineral supplements would prevent off-flavors in milk. Some of these products have been studied and results show that none of the supplements tested prevented the occurrence of off-flavors.

the 1953 crop; or whether they do not want quotas.

Marketing quotas will continue in effect if two-thirds or more of the growers voting in the referendum cast favorable ballots.

The purpose of the marketing quotas is to provide growers with a method of adjusting supply to demand and to help them obtain fair prices for the tobacco they produce.

County Chairman Enloe said anyone who has an interest in the 1952 crop of burley tobacco, either owner, tenant, or sharecropper, is entitled to one vote on the question of marketing quotas. Each person concerned, however, is entitled to only one vote even though he may be engaged in the production of burley in two or more communities, he explained.

Acreage allotments will be continued in 1953 if marketing quotas are approved, he said, and notices with specific farm acreage allotments for 1953 will be sent to farm operators before the date of the referendum.

Mr. Enloe added that price support loans at 90 per cent of parity will be provided for 1953 crop tobacco if the quotas are approved.

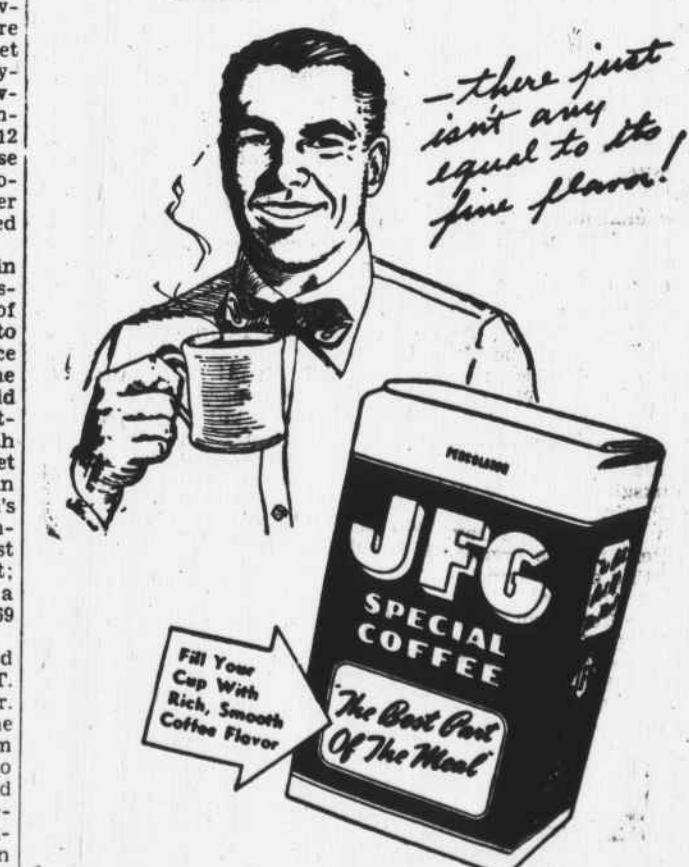
